Volleyball team spikes into action

The Meredith volleyball team has been spending long hours practicing and their hardwork is beginning to payoff. During September the Angels compiled a respectable 4-5 record, defeating Ferrum in their opening match 2-0 and also triumphing over Chowan, 2-1; Mount Olive, 2-0; and Coker, 2-1. The losses were dealt by Greensboro College, 7-2; Atlantic Christian, 1-2 and 1-2; Methodist, 2-3. The most recent match against Coker, Coach Chamblee described as "our most well-played match yet." "I'm really expecting them to play that well from now on," she added. Sophomore player Kim Smith commented, "We had been on a losing streak, but the Coker game was a real turnaround. It was like a different team out there."

Coach Chamblee also described the team's strengths and weaknesses. "Sue Reese and Julie Jones (team captains) are our top players and best hitters." This is Reese's fourth year on the team. Jones is also a senior and is playing for the third year. Junior Corina Porras, the team's co-captain, is the best all around and defensive player,

according to Coach Chamblee. "The team strengths," she says, "are the four returning players (Reese, Jones, Porras and sophomore Amanda Brooks) who have had a lot of playing time and are consistent." The team's hitters (Reese and Jones along with sophomore Sandy Blackman) are also very strong. The team needs to work on "passing on defense," Coach Chamblee stated. Another problem is that the players are starting in positions new to them, which causes difficulties in reacting to situations and positioning. This problem, obviously, will be overcome with time.

Other returning players are sophomore Yvette Brown and junior Crystal Lennon. Sophomore Melanie Ford and freshman April Shelton are new to the team. Other people devoting their time to the volleyball team are: Christy McDaid and Amy Adams, statisticians; Kay Crowder, scorer; Lisa Crabtree and Kim Smith, trainers; Amelia Stinson, manager; and Dr. Bross, assistant coach.
