Dr. Jane Goodall, world renown scientific expert and author on the subject of primate behavior, will speak at Meredith College on April 20 and 21. Her visit to Raleigh is the only North Carolina stop during this trip to the U.S.

On Friday, April 20 at 10:00 a.m., Dr. Goodall will speak in Jones Auditorium to Meredith College students, faculty and staff about her career challenges and opportunites. On Saturday, April 21 at 10:30 a.m. also in Jones Auditorium, she will adress the Carolinas Psychology Conference to discuss her research and her scientific observations with the group.

Dr. Goodal and her accomplishments have become legendary since she began her work in 1960 as the protege of famed anthropologist/ paleontologist Dr.Louis S. B. Leakey. She completed her Ph. D. in ethology at Cambridge University, England, in 1965 and founded The Gombe Stream Reasearch Center that same year. Through publication of five books, her appearances on National Geogrpahic Society specials and her annual lecture tour, Jane Goodall has become one of the most respected and publicly recognized scientists in the world. Within the scientific community, she has published numberous articles and has been credited with the first recorded observations of chimps eating meat and making and using tools -- the latter believed until that time to distinguish man from all other animals. The World Wildlife Fund has recognized her research as the longest unbroken field of study of any group of animals in their natural habitat ever conducted.

The seating for the lecture is expected to be limited and will be by student identification card or ticket along with press passes.
