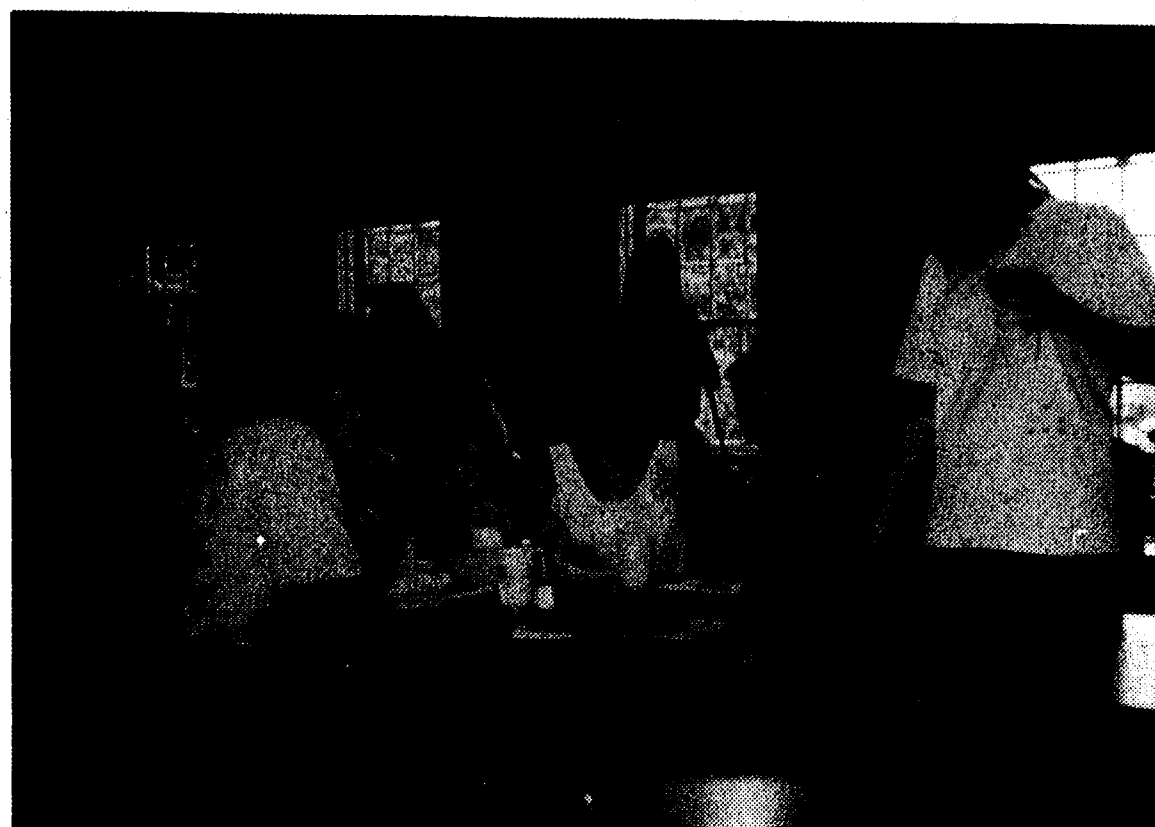

On September 7, eleven Meredith art students leave for a semester in Paris. Through this program the students will be able to focus their complete attention to their art. Meredith College leases a studio in Paris, which was once occupied by the romantic artist Toulouse Latrec in the 19th century. The students will study with the internationally known artist, Ben Long. The students will work for four mornings and two evenings per week. During the afternoons they will visit museums and/or draw in the streets, cafes, or cemeteries. On weekends the students have the opportunity to travel around Europe. For example, one of the trips planned is to Venice to view the largest ever Titan show.

To become a part of this program the student must apply with her portfolio,

have serious intentions of being a studio artist. Three of the students accepted were awarded a \$800 scholarship by a vote of the Art Department Faculty. Edgar Davis gave the donation in honor of his wife, Eleanor Layfield Davis, who attended Meredith and is now an accomplished artist. She is presenting a show September 16 in the rotunda of Johnson Hall at Meredith.

There are many advantages to this program. For instance, the students will gain 15 credit hours. Also two advantages according to Dr. Craig Green, Chairman of the Art Department, are the possibilities for the students becoming successful are much greater after their time in Paris and the students bring back with them a spirit of competitiveness which the whole department benefits.
