Meredith to offer television production class for fall semester


Meredith College is honored to have Dr. Terry Kauffman as a distinguished faculty member. Dr. Kauffman is an N.C. State University communication lecturer. She has incorporated all of her interests into a job that fulfills her love of television broadcasting and production. She has also gained the Triangle's recognition with her weekly cable show, "Women Today", and her heightening of the public's awareness of environmental issues.

Dr. Kauffman has produced, directed and written thirteen documentaries for the San Francisco Environment Center. These broadcasts helped her win a National Broadcasting award. She has also written "Thanksgiving", a drama for PBS, and she had a televised art exhibit containing portraits and songs which she composed.

Dr. Kauffman's proposed new course at Meredith is entitled Television Production Design. It is a survey of writing, directing and editing techniques for television, video and film. Theory and practice of scriptwriting for news, features, documentaries and drama will also be covered. Students learn broadcast journalism and writing skills, and even write short radio and television news pieces, a short feature or documentary program for television, and a short dramatic teleplay or screenplay. Students study the principles of shooting and editing for these formats, including programs like "60 Minutes", and the difference between single camera field shooting and multi-cam studio production. This is primarily a non-production course; however, an

optional lab with production capability is offered.

There is no prerequisite and everyone is encouraged to register for it. Former students sing high praises for its challenging content and the fun aspect of finding out what "really" goes on in a production. SPE 940-A will be offered in the fall of 1992 on Mondays and Wednesdays from 3:30-4:20. If demand is insufficient, Meredith reserves the right to cancel the course—so be sure to register!
