
Student outraged by Meredith advertisement

every student gripes about, but never tries to solve. How can we better our image in the state and nation? Well, advertising for mediocre students in a high school newspaper is not the way to achieve one. Meredith College recently ran an advertisement in Apex High's school newspaper, which is reprinted below. The ad appealed to C-average students with low SAT scores. This gives high school students the impression that "Hey, if I can't get in Carolina, I always have Meredith to fall back on." Thus, we've basically reached the point where enrollment is dropping so quickly, Meredith will accept almost anyone who has money to pay. However, the reason enrollment has continued to slump is because our residence policies are prehistoric.
