- Liberal Jean Chritien won Canada's election for the new prime minister Monday ending nine years of Conservative rule.
- Charlotte, NC, has been granted an NFL expansion team. The team will be called the Carolina Panthers. Charlotte was picked from a field of five cities—St. Louis, Baltimore, Memphis, and Jacksonville.
- Monday, the Raleigh/ Durham/Chapel Hill area was named as the sixth best place to live in the nation by *Places Rated Almanac*, and Tuesday, *Fortune* magazine named the area as the best city for for business relations in the nation.
- A Democratic supporter of Governor Jim Hunt pleaded guilty to an infraction stemming from accusations that she used a radio scanner to listen to phone conversations between Republican Jim Gardner and his son.
- Shane Beasly, 17, of Smithfield was sentenced to 10 years in prison Monday for throwing a cemetery urn off of an I-95 overpass on Feb. 26 that nearly killed Ellen Daley.
- Vice President Al Gore visited a Charlotte school to learn about its "Cities in Schools" dropout prevention program. The program has a 96 percent success rate at 14 area schools.
- The Toronto Blue Jays defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-6, Saturday night winning the World Series for the second consecutive time. Joe Carter's homerun in the bottom of the ninth inning gave the Blue Jays the lead.
- Actor Vincent Price, known for his fiendish roles, died of lung cancer Monday at his home at the age of 82.

Each student had previously submitted an original case study based upon field research. The papers were blind reviewed and accepted for the conference in July. The papers were written by Elaine Buxton, Sharon Segrest, Laura Dupree, Alicia Bauman and Monica Hendricksen.

Hendrickson received the best case award, and Bauman received an honorable mention in the student division. Buxton, who graduated in May 1993, received a third place award in the faculty competition. The papers were written under the direction of Dr. James Crew, Associate Professor of Management.

The Southeast Case Research Association is an affiliate of the North American Case Research Association. Its stated purposes are to:
