Security urges students to be cautious

Meredith is not not immune to crime

Students and members of Meredith are showing a rising concern for the issue of crime on campus. It is an important aspect of college life, and everyone wants to do what she can to insure personal safety and the security of those around her.

In the 23 years that Police Officer and Chief of Security Dan Shattuck has been in charge of Security at Meredith College, there have been no major incidents, but Shattuck says that does not mean that nothing will ever

happen here, and he warns students to "be safe."

Crimes that have occurred at Meredith are vandalism, theft of personal belongings from dorm rooms, theft of classroom supplies and theft of media supplies. There was also one assault during the 1992-93 school year, but no one was injured and the offender was caught and sentenced to ten years in prison.

Statistics show that Meredith is fortunate to have such a well-trained, competent security staff. They have worked hard to help Meredith's crime

level remain at a minimum.

"We have a good record here, but anything can happen," Chief Shattuck said. "The only way to be perfectly safe is to have one security guard per student and that can't happen."

Chief Shattuck offered several safety tips that he and his staff try to instill in Meredith students:

1. Do not walk alone.
2. Be confident. Look like you know where you are going.
