Leadership Conference held despite weather

Last Saturday the Winter Leadership Conference took place here at Meredith College in Ledford Hall. The conference was entitled "Empowering Women: On the Roads We Travel." The conference was originally scheduled for Saturday, February 3, but was postponed because of bad weather.

The conference was designed by a committee consisting of a representative from each class. The members were Mika Murdoch, Regina Mack, Clarky Lucas, Allison Carter, and Heather Wilkin. The committee was overseen by Shelly Hoover and Cheryl Jenkins who both work in the Office of Student Activities.

Rhonda Mann from North Carolina State University was the keynote speaker. Her lecture was entitled "The Signs of Progress and the Turns for Change: A Road Map for Women." Mann's lecture consisted of a "herstory" lesson with facts on eleven women that were well-known and not so well-known to many Americans.

Mann advises young women who plan to be future leaders to "not let anyone ever tell you because you are a woman that you can't do anything."

Paul Potorti was one of the break out session speakers. His lecture was entitled "Exploring the Roadblocks Among Women and Men." He spoke about how women and men can communicate, they have different ways to express their feelings.

Potorti says, "The most fundamental thing is basic communication. You must realize that the way you communicate with others should be the way you want others to communicate with you."

The second break out session speaker was Sharon Cannon, Meredith Dean of Students. Her lecture was entitled "Motivate to Escalate." Dean Cannon spoke mainly about setting goals in order to reach your highest potential. If an individual is motivated then she has the ability to motivate others.

At the end of the day, the committee members led round table discussions of topics that were mentioned throughout the conference or pertained to women's issues of today. Overall, the conference received positive comments from many of those who attended.
