From the tip-off Meredith controlled the game by playing tenacious defense and capitalizing on Mary Baldwin turnovers. During the first half, the Angels kept the ball away from Mary Baldwin, which didn't score its first points until 10:15 remained in the first


Led by guard Nina Mouzone's three pointers, Mary Baldwin
