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Heilman fire displaces students

□ Cause of fire may never be known.

The events that transpired during the early morning hours on Monday, April 10, had many students wondering if Heilman had some sort of curse.

Indeed, for the second time in four years, Heilman residence hall caught fire, damaging rooms and leaving students without permanent residences.

In the fall of 1996, the second floor of Heilman caught fire. That fire was caused by faulty wiring.

Monday's fire, which began in the first-floor laundry room trash can, was most likely caused by a cigarette, though the Raleigh Fire Department will probably never know what, in fact, caused the blaze.

Around 3 a.m. on Monday, Heilman residents were awakened to the sound of the fire alarm. After a four-minute evacuation of the building, which Campus Police Chief Frank Strickland called a "record," students realized that this was no drill.

The alarm went off automatically, for it has smoke alarms

and heat sensors.

Strickland said that the Raleigh Fire Department arrived in approximately six minutes, which he said was "excellent response time." The Fire Department remained on campus for nearly three hours, removing everything from the laundry room to ensure that no reignition would occur.

Michelle Aheron, residence director of Heilman, said that the set of double doors on the first floor kept the fires from spreading.

Meanwhile, Heilman residents were relocated to Jones Auditorium, where they found Vice President for Student Development Jean Jackson, President Maureen

Hartford and her husband Jay, Dean of Undergraduate Instruction Allen Page, Vice President for Institutional Advancement Murphy Osborne, Executive Vice President Chuck Taylor, Campus Minister Sam Carothers and Dean of Students Ann Gleason.

Early Monday morning, several companies arrived at

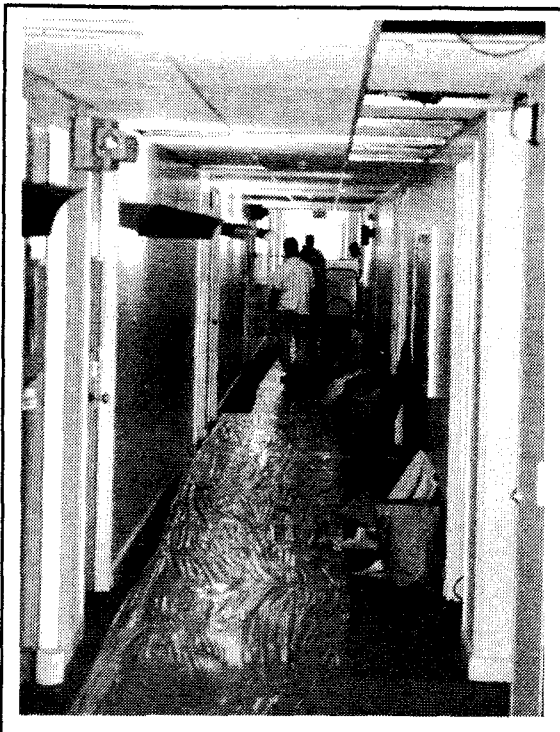
Meredith. These companies specialize in cleaning up and restoring after fires.

The workers are working on the first floor and in several rooms on the second and third floors.

Currently, most second- and third-floor residents of Heilman are still living in their room and those who had to leave can return by 6 p.m. today. However, first-floor residents will not be able to return to their rooms for the remainder of the semester. Tuesday morning, staff and administration found out from the cleaning crews that they would need another six weeks to two months to repair the damage on the first-floor.

This week, according to Gleason, the reconstruction crews will work on repairing the second and third floors of the residence hall. Three rooms on second floor and four rooms on third floor will be repainted and receive new ceilings.

Strickland said that the crews will clean all the soot off the walls, replace damaged carpet and replace lost
