Volleyball triumphs over Peace

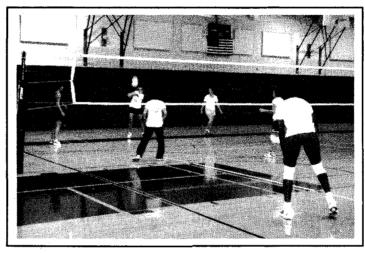
Friday night the Angels faced Chowan College, putting another victory under their belt. The scores in the three games were 15-4, 15-10 and 15-4 respectively.
