

Rain did not stop students from remembering MLK

Meredit students honor King in March to memorial on Monday.

Dreary weather was not enough to stop dedicated marchers from remembering the dream.

On Monday, Jan. 21, Meredith students participated in a march to observe Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s message.

Meredith College's Association for Cultural Awareness (ACA) coordinated the event for Meredith College and provided transportation for students who were interested in participating in the march.

Students from Meredith, North Carolina State University, Peace College and Shaw

University united to remember Dr. King's message.

The march began at 11:00 a.m. on Monday morning at the Museum of History, and it ended at downtown Raleigh's BTI Center for the Performing Arts.

Various speakers commented on what Dr. King's birthday means to them.

Prior to the march, ACA members Stenisha Green, Kendra Edwards, Davetta Landers, and Tiana Akai attended a breakfast at Shaw University.

Akai said that the march brought students and people of all races and ethnic backgrounds together.

King was born on Jan. 15, 1929 in Atlanta, GA. He skipped ninth and twelfth grades and went to Morehouse College where he graduated in 1948 with a B.A. in sociology.

He married Coretta Scott in

1953 and had 4 children.

He was awarded a Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1951 from Crozer Theological Seminary and also has several honorary doctorates from Yale, Hofstra, University of New Castle Upon Tyne, Boston University and Howard University.

His famous "I Have a Dream" speech was delivered on the steps of Lincoln Memorial in 1963, inspiring a nation to abandon hate and value equality.

His *Leter from Birmingham Jail* ranks among some of the most important American writing today.

James Earl Ray, who was arrested in 1969 in London, shot King while standing on a balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1968.

He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 99 years in the

Angels bring 82-point victory

Angels upset Bennett in 82-point victory.

The Angels upset the court last night against Bennett College in an 82-point victory. The final score was 108-26.

The Angels began their warm-up for Tuesday night's game against Bennett in a care-free mood. They were shooting hoops to loud music and laughing--all precursors to the landslide.

In the opening tip-off, Bennett won the ball which was quickly turned over and received by freshman Tina Harkness who made a quick pass to sophomore Beth Vernon for an easy 2 points.

Skillful passing by junior Tracy Sumner to junior Amber Scott resulted in a 2-pointer by Scott.

Bennett snuck in 2 points only to be out-scored with 2 more points from senior Ginger Moore. Bennett appeared to be quick-footed but not quick enough as Harkness intercepted a pass. Harkness passed to sophomore Ruth Stephenson

who scored 2 points.

The high-paced action and constant scoring by the Angels continued through the remainder of the game.

Ashley Myers and Jessica Lineberry showed excellent passing skills in setting up for a shot by Harkness who scored 2 points despite a Bennett player's attempt to thwart the shot by grabbing Harkness' jersey.

The Angels did a lot of full-court pressing to intimidate Bennett, which seemed to do the job: Approaching the half, was 57-9 Meredith.

In the second half, the Angels scored 51 additional points.

Myers, Vernon, Sumner, Stephenson and Mary Beth Barnes all put in several great shots.

It was Vernon's foul shot that put Meredith at 100 points in the fourth quarter. Up until the fourth quarter, Bennett remained at only 9 points.

However Bennett player Christina Johnson and Nicole Hayes contributed 17 points to reach the final score of 26.
