Rideout said this year's event had been in the planning process since the beginning of the summer. She worked with Alyson Colwell-Waber, associate dean for academic Affairs, Cheryl Jenkins, director of student activities and leadership development, Ann Gleason, dean of students, as well staff members within the Office of Institutional Advancement on the planning and devel-

opment of Family Day.
