Master Plan sessions explain options for campus development

Sessions answer questions and give bright outlook on development of the College.

Master Plan sessions were held last Thursday in Belk Dining Hall at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. to discuss the longterm plans for campus renovation and improvement.

The two sessions provided faculty, students and staff with an opportunity to learn the different options the school is considering and to share their comments and suggestions.

"I thought the session was very informative," said Residence Life Director Heidi LeCount. "I liked seeing the three distinct plans and appreciated the architects taking the time to learn what we liked about each one."

The Master Plan session showed three options for campus development. Each option was displayed with a composite view and an artistic rendering of the proposed campus.

"These sessions are an important part of the process [of campus planning]," said Bill Wade, vice president of business and finance. "It's not just going to be a group of architects that dream up what they want. Students, faculty and staff are going to be able to tell us what they want the future campus to look like.

"The three plans will be displayed in the Carlyle Campbell Library. Comment cards will be provided to encourage students and faculty to share their opinions.

Wade said the project consists of four five-year intervals of campus develop-

ment which create on overall 20-year plan.

"The changes for the first five years we are pretty sure about, while the later phases are more conceptual and less defined," he said.

Wade said pressing concerns, such as the overcrowding of Joyner Hall and renovations to Harris and Hunter Halls, would be addressed in the first phase of planning. Each of the three plans also addresses possible changes to athletic facilities, parking and the student recreation center.

Director of Operations Tom Sherry said the plans are part of an overall transition "into a time that will be very forward and visionary for the school."

"In the college environment, there is no status quo," Sherry said. "If you just settle down, you will fall behind in the competition. There's always the need to be growing and improving."

The three plans varied in the areas of the vehicular circulation and parking, athletics facilities, open spaces, and future building use for administration, athletics, academics, residential and student life.

Visiting Senior Lauren Trojan said, "It [the visit] the speeches showed me what I could do here."


But a few visitors had dislikes about Meredith. Heather Gregory said she didn't like the smoking. "I'm allergic," she said.
