In Afghanistan, six American soldiers were wounded this week. Military officials said that five of the six injuries were possibly caused by Afghanistan's Al Qaeda supporters. Two of the injuries occurred when a bomb went off under a vehicle, and another soldier was shot in the leg while patrolling in Afghanistan. The United Kingdom has also begun to deploy soldiers to the Gulf in its first military action towards Iraq. Troops should be stationed in Kuwait sometime in February.
