For example, in her section on "Tips for managing your mealtime" she writes, "Eat more veggies, they are easier for the food chain to produce than meat and are a better use of resources," and the fact that "the cans thrown away each year by Americans would wrap around the earths equator 164 times!" Tidbits of information like this taken seriously could really make a difference in our world today.

If one is interested in being a missionary or taking a short-term mission trip, this book gives pertinent information about writing letters for support and finding organizations who offer missionary opportunities. This book also gives practical exam-

ples of things that people can do in their communities for a worthy cause.




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Haynes For Historian
