Antiwar Protesters Around the World Speak Up

Protestors appear to be frustrated over a number of aspects surrounding the war in Iraq. Many believe US intervention has not helped improve the way of life for Iraqis. Iraqis themselves seem to be split about their feelings on the war in Iraq. Some feel that life has improved since the war, while others feel even more fearful due to the increased bombings and guerilla attacks. Protestors have also expressed anger over the fact that the US

government has failed to locate any weapons of mass destruction in Iraq. Many seem to feel to confused and even misled over the initial purpose of the war.

Protests took place from Asia to Europe to the United States. Recently, however, the most anger over the war has taken place in Spain. The reason for such emotion
