"Out of the 20 most developed countries in the world, the United States ranks 19th in math and science", Bowles said. He suggested this could be reversed through focusing emphasis on math and science

in our public school systems, and stopping the budget cuts that are hurting our students. "Out of those 20 countries, the United States ranks 11th in the use of high-speed Internet technology", Bowles continued. The U.S. has to improve its Internet connections and provide more job opportunities through the use of online networks, Bowles suggested.



Today one out of three jobs in North Carolina is still related Agriculture, **Bowles** declared. He said this indicated that North Carolinians should pay special attention to the state agency of Agriculture when electing a commissioner this year. 
