Masdar City: An Experiment in Renewable Energy on a Municipal Scale

When you first see images of the new experimental metropolis Masdar City, the futuristic designs will make you feel like you are looking at screen shots out of a Star Wars movie. According to the Masdar Initiative website, Masdar City, located in one of the world's most sustainable urban developments, is powered by renewable energy.

Situated ten and a half miles from downtown Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, it is made for companies, schools, and families who want to focus on renewable energy and clean technology. Renewable energy comes from natural resources such as sunlight, wind, rain, tides, and geothermal heat. It is used for all the same purposes that electricity, or oil

are used for. Masdar City has rooftops made of solar power panels, one of the most popular forms of renewable energy used today.

According to the August 28, 2009 Designboom article "LAVA wins first prize for Masdar – world's first sustainable city in UAE. Giant umbrellas, with a design based on the principles of sunflowers, will provide moveable shade in the day, store heat, then close and release the heat at night in the plaza of a new eco-city". Construction of this magnificent city began in 2008 and is planned to be finished by 2016, with finished projects opening as soon as fall 2010.


