All-Girls' School Continued

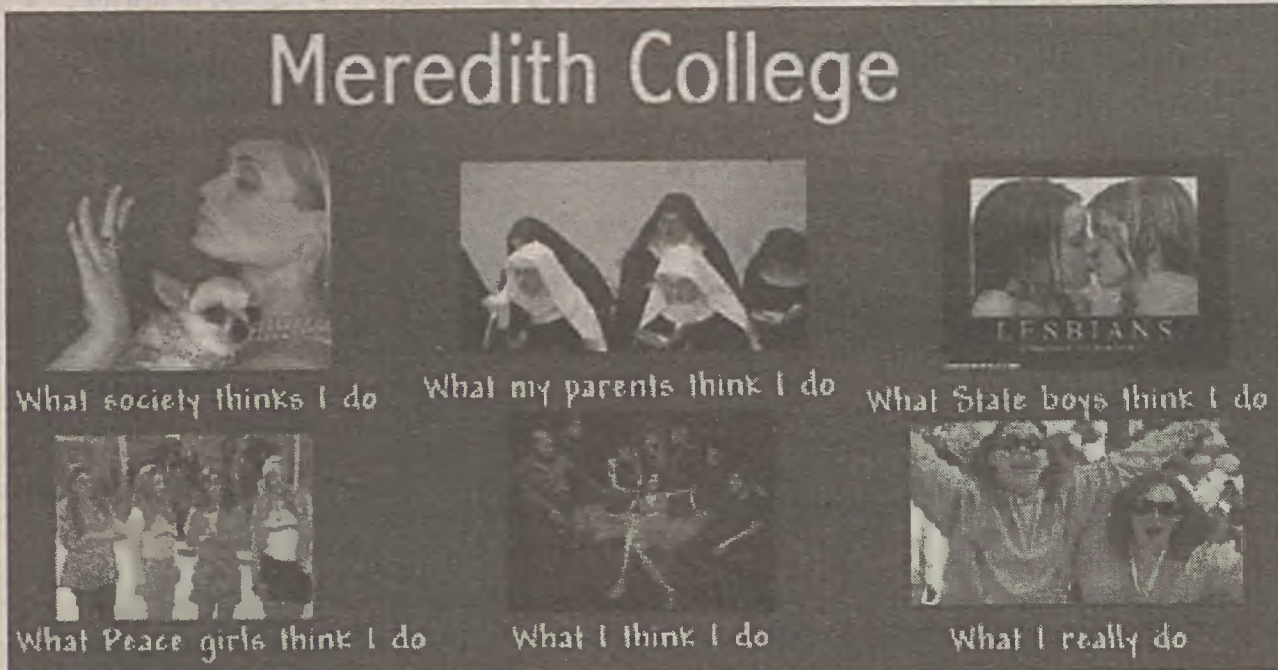
