

through this office, as well as soil testing mailing containers, with printed forms and an explanation of how to interpret the analysis once its been mailed back to you???

We've talked about this before, but feel it is worth an encore mention.

THE THRIFT SHOP on Turner Street in Beaufort, behind the yellow restored house, welcomes your spring cleaning rejects, including clothes, household goods like anything from sheets to pots and pans, knick-knacks, jewelry, hats, purses - everything but furniture, for which they have no room.

Mrs. MAY GRAY of Beaufort manages the shop, which is sponsored by the Beaufort Historical Society and staffed entirely by volunteers. All proceeds go toward the restoration of the old buildings, and one week every penny went toward the fixing up of the old burial grounds.

Occasionally, clothing and household items are given to families with emergency needs following fires, and once a wide assortment of children's shoes was donated directly through a school when it was discovered that many of the students there did not have proper footwear. Hours are: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, from 11 to 3.

And there is another Thrift Shop, this one run by the women of the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church. It is on Evans St. in Morehead City, opposite the fire house, near the Webb Library and Rose's parking lot, is open Tuesday and Thursday from 10 to 4, and Saturday from 10 to 12. Monies go toward helping migrant workers in this area. So...if you find something in your house that you don't need any longer, take it to one of these two spots. You will be welcomed.
