Pine Knoll Shores' ability to protect trees preserved. Recent legislation under consideration by the North Carolina General Assembly (SB 367) contained language that would have affected the town's ability to protect our environment by controlling the removal of trees and maritime vegetation. Citizens of Pine Knoll Shores and those from other towns in danger of having their local tree ordinances undermined by this legislation reached out to their representatives to express their concerns. As a result of this grassroots effort, the language in the bill was changed, and the regulatory authority of the towns remains intact. Thanks is extended to Senator Norman Sanderson and Representative Pat McElraft for considering these citizen concerns.
