Susan Toms leads a "slow flow" yoga class at noon on Wednesdays at Hammer Park. Providing a way to get together safely and connect in a beautiful setting, sessions average about a dozen participants, but as many as 25 have attended. Experience isn't needed to enjoy these classes, and several options are given for every pose—students are encouraged to listen to their bodies. Susan stresses that yoga is no longer thought of as just for those who can do splits and put their legs behind their necks but that it is more about connecting with your body, breath and mind. She sees herself as a guide and is pleased when she looks at the group and sees everyone doing something different because she knows they are moving in a way that suits their bodies.
