December gardening tips from the NC Cooperative Extension Master Gardeners:

- Poinsettia plants like indirect, natural daylight for five or six hours a day. Keep them away from heat sources, and do not over water, but do not let them dry out either, maintaining moist soil. This same advice applies to your cyclamen and amaryllis.
- Pansies and ornamental cabbage should be lightly fertilized.
- It is time to apply postemergence weed control to your lawn before winter weeds begin growing. Apply once again in February for good measure.
- Lantana should not be cut back to ground level. Leave some stems and cover with mulch.
- Spring blooming bulbs can still be planted this month as well as up until mid-January.
