A realtor showing a house in Pine knoll Shores called to report a bird fluttering in the yard, unable to fly. With our guidance, she was able to capture it, put it in a small cardboard box, and bring it to us. Physical exam showed a concussion, which usually means the bird flew into a window. But this female cardinal also had a "mystery injury"—a puncture wound through the top of the beak, with stress cracks to the edge of the beak. First things first: she was treated with steroid injections for several days to help cur

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
