## WASTE INDUSTRIES GUIDELINES FOR YARD TRASH

All yard trash should be on the curb by 7:00 AM on the morning of the pickup day, which is the last Tuesday in each month.

Rakings, such as leaves and pine straw, must be bagged. Limbs and branches must be in 4 foot lengths, 18 inches in diameter and bundled.

Trash bags and bundles can weigh no more than 50 pounds each. Logs, stumps and lot debris, such as sweeping a lot for building, are not acceptable.
