A one-man play about North Carolina's esteemed Senator Sam J. Ervin, Jr., perhaps best known as the colorful chairman of the Watergate Hearings, is coming to the History Place in Morehead City on Friday and Saturday June 13-14 at 8 p.m. and Sunday June 15 at 2 p.m.

Senator Sam, by North Carolina playwright Steve Bouser, is set in Senator Ervin's backyard on August 8, 1974, the day President Richard Nixon announced his resignation. In the play, Senator Ervin
