Commissioner Larry Corsello retired as Vice President of Marketing & Sales and Specialty Manufacturing of Sumitomo Electric Lightwave (SEL) in the Research Triangle Park in 1997. After SEL he worked for a couple of venture capital technology start-up companies and moved to Pine Knoll Shores in 2000.
