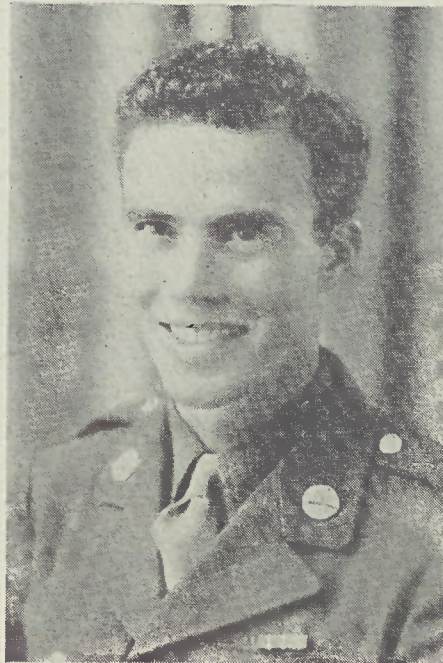

LAGGING PRODUCTION

Army production, which aggregated \$1,885,000,000 in May, must be increased in the fall of this year to \$2,270,000,000 per month, an increase of 17 per cent over the May rate, if our 1944 requirements are realized. The failure to achieve present schedules indicates that our needs can be met only with an intensified all-out war production effort which will call for the utmost endeavor on the part of both management and labor. Each slippage in monthly schedules adds to this problem. There can be no relaxation in our determination to meet these goals if our present strategy is to bring the results designed. There must be no decrease in our pressure on the enemy, and a constant stream of war munitions is essential to the maintenance of this pressure.
