New Manager At Zion Lace Mill Was Formerly in Wage Bureau

E. W. Medbery, who was appointed manager of the Fieldcrest Lace Curtain Mill at Zion, Ill., recently, is well-represented in the Tri-Cities where he was employed from 1937 until 1940 as a member of the Wage Bureau. His work here involved time studies, method improvements and job evaluation. He served as secretary of the original Job Analysis Committee for the North Carolina mills.

He was born in South Dakota and received his early education in that State. He was graduated in 1929 from the University of South Dakota with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering. Following this he studied business management and accounting at night school for eight years at Northwestern and Loyola Universities in Chicago and was licensed by the State of Illinois as a Certified Public Accountant in 1937.

His first work in the engineering field was with the Western Electric Company in Chicago, as a development engineer, where he worked out new manufacturing processes and designed automatic production machines, some of which were patented. After five years in this kind of work at Western Electric he was employed by Marshall Field and Company in 1936 as an industrial engineer, and worked one and one-half years at Zion before coming to Spray in 1937.

In 1940 Medbery resigned from the Wage Bureau at Spray to go with the Patchogue-Pymouth Mills Corporation, manufacturers of lace curtains, seat cover materials, and other products. He served as industrial engineer for this firm until 1942 when he entered the U. S.
