"When Foreman and Steward Bargain" by Glenn Gardiner. The author in a brief foreword says in part, "The book is written primarily for foremen who sincerely desire to develop and maintain successful relations with union stewards....The most important phase of collective bargaining is carried on in the day-to-day relations between foremen and stewards. That is where good labor relations must begin."

"Foreman's Handbook" edited by Carl Heyel. Contains chapters on Planning and Scheduling; Quality Control and Waste Reduction; Industrial Fatigue; Merit Rating of Employees; etc.

"How To Supervise People" by Alfred M. Cooper. According to Carl Heyel, who reviewed the book for the Magazine Management Review, this volume is a "must" for upper executives, foremen, supervisors, and ambitious employees.
