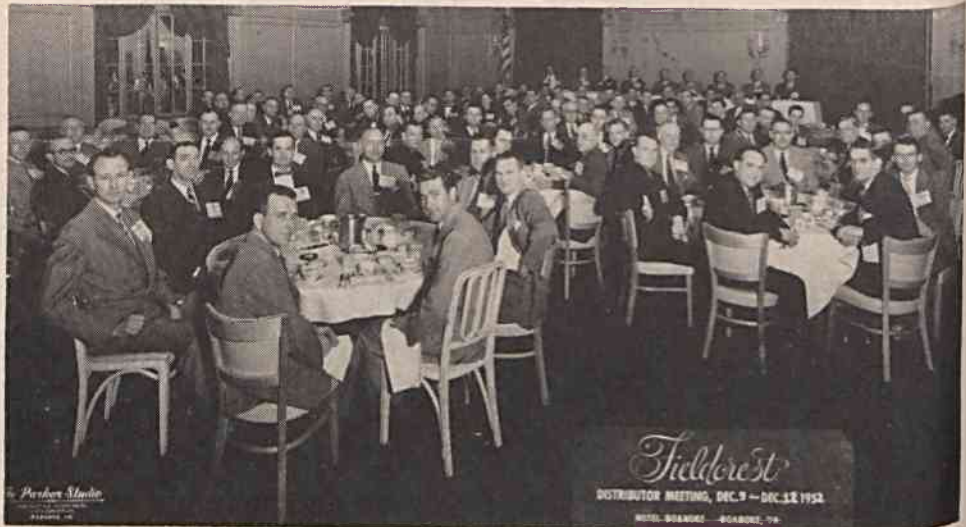
Young Marshall is a Leaksville native and graduated from high school here in
