Jackie Powell, a student at State College, spent the week-end at home with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Powell.

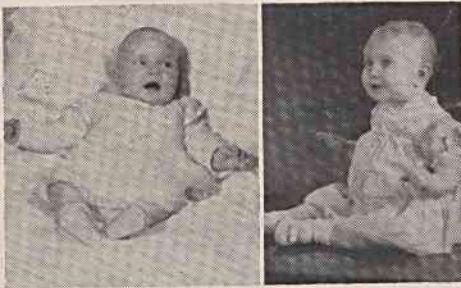
Mickey Ball, of the Navy, visited his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earlie Ball.

Kitchen Koment

All clothes should be checked for stains at the time soiled laundry is sorted. Stains should be removed before clothes are washed or they may be "set" by the washing process.

Clothes that are kept clean wear longer. Wash clothing before it becomes too dirty, for long, hard washing to remove accumulated dirt sometimes is responsible for loss of color. It is easier and more economical to launder clothes frequently.

Sugar should be kept in a covered container. If it becomes lumpy, it should be sifted before using. The lumps can be pulverized with a rolling pin. If sugar hardens into one big mass, it can be restored by heating in the oven while wrapped in a damp cotton cloth. Then pound and roll with a rolling pin.
