## Four Are Named New Directors Of Company

Pictures at left show new members of the board of directors of Marshall Field & Company elected at the recent meeting of the shareholders. By-laws of the Company were amended at the January, 1953 meeting of the board of directors to increase the number of directors from nine to twelve.

At the January meeting, Mr. Marshall Field announced his intention of not standing for reelection as a director. Concerning the announcement by Mr. Field, Hughston M. McBain, chairman of Marshall Field & Company, stated:

"A grandson of the founder, Mr. Field's devotion to the Company's welfare has contributed greatly to its advancement through the 38 years of his directorial service. His intention to terminate that service is received with regret."

Mr. McBain announced that at the annual meeting of the shareholders in March, Mr. John M. Budd, president of the Great Northern Railway, Mr. Marshall Field, Jr., editor and publisher of the Chicago Sun-Times, Mr. William V. Kahler, president of the Illinois Bell Telephone Company, and Mr. Harold J. Nutting, vice president, and general manager of Field's Chicago retail stores, were elected as directors of Marshall Field & Company.

Mr. Budd, a Yale graduate, began as a chainman in the engineering department on the railroad he now serves as president. He was a lieutenant colonel in the Military Railway Service in the last war, serving the U. S. Army in Africa, Italy, France and Germany. He makes his home in St. Paul, Minn.

Mr. McBain pointed out that the Great Northern Railway served the Pacific Northwest and Seattle where the remodelled and enlarged Frederick & Nelson store, a division of Marshall Field & Company, is located.

Mr. Field, Jr., is a graduate of Harvard and the University of Virginia law school, and is a great-grandson of the founder of Marshall Field & Company. In addition to his responsibilities as editor and publisher of the Chicago Sun-Times, he is a director and vice-president of Field Enterprises, Inc. He is a member of the Chicago Bar Associ-
