

## Seamed Sheets Replace Former Remnants Pack

Due to a method change in which sheet remnants have been practically eliminated, seamed sheets at attractive prices are available at the Employees Store. When the seam is near the end, the material can be used as a sheet; otherwise the goods has the same uses as the sheet remnants formerly sold at the Employees Store.

Seamed sheets are available in standard sizes in Wearwell and Duracale qualities, both white and colored. Prices are such that the seamed sheets offer as great and sometimes greater value than the former packaged sheet remnants. Wearwell, white, 81x108 sells for \$1.15; Duracale, white, 81x108, is priced at \$1.42.

Like the remnants, the seamed sheets are packaged and may not be opened before purchasing, since no selection is permissible.
