As Check Was Written For Purchase Of Leaksville Hospital



The Tri-Cities took the first step toward securing a modern, public-owned community hospital December 22, when trustees of the newly chartered Tri-City Hospital, Inc. purchased the plant and physical properties of Leaksville Hospital from Dr. C. V. Tyner and the estate of the late Dr. Kenan Casteen.

A gift to the community of \$50,000 from the Marshall Field & Company, and a \$45,000 grant from the Duke Endowment, enabled the trustees, acting on behalf of the community, to purchase the hospital which will be operated as

a public institution until a new 50-bed hospital can be built in a central location.

The trustees are studying the project of a new hospital for which it is believed approximately two-thirds of the cost can be obtained from federal and state sources under the Hill-Burton Act.
