Mutual Aid Posts Yearly Statement

The annual financial statement of the United Mutual Aid association to be posted in the mills today shows 1954 receipts of \$98,032.11. More than 1400 claims were paid, with expenditures totalling \$89,168.94. The remainder was added to the association's reserve, which stood at \$43,778.62 as the year ended. (The auditor's report appears on page seven.)

Following lengthy investigations and study by the board of directors, the bylaws were revised in August of 1954 to bring the benefits more in line with present-day hospital costs. At the same times, dues were increased to pay for the additional benefits. Although the reserve at the end of 1954 was greater than at the start of the year, the association has more liability due to the greater benefits now available to its members and larger reserves are need-
