Avoid Lifting Injuries: These Tips Will Help You

- 1. Never try to lift beyond your strength. Get help.
- 2. Always crouch down to the object.
- 3. Get a good footing.
- 4. Watch closely for snags and slivers when picking up materials.
- 5. Get a firm grip with fingers underneath the load whenever possible.
- 6. Keep your arms straight and keep your back in as nearly a straight up-and-down position as possible.
- 7. Lift gradually—avoid jerky motions.
- 8. Avoid twisting motions by shifting the position of your feet.
- 9. Lift by pushing upward with the strong leg muscles. This takes the strain off the back muscles.
- 10. Put things down by generally reversing the above methods. -National Safety Council
