Avoid Lifting Injuries: These Tips Will Help You

1. Never try to lift beyond your strength. Get help.
 2. Always crouch down to the object.
 3. Get a good footing.
 4. Watch closely for snags and slivers when picking up materials.
 5. Get a firm grip with fingers underneath the load whenever possible.
 6. Keep your arms straight and keep your back in as nearly a straight up-and-down position as possible.
 7. Lift gradually—avoid jerky motions.
 8. Avoid twisting motions by shifting the position of your feet.
 9. Lift by pushing upward with the strong leg muscles. This takes the strain off the back muscles.
 10. Put things down by generally reversing the above methods.
