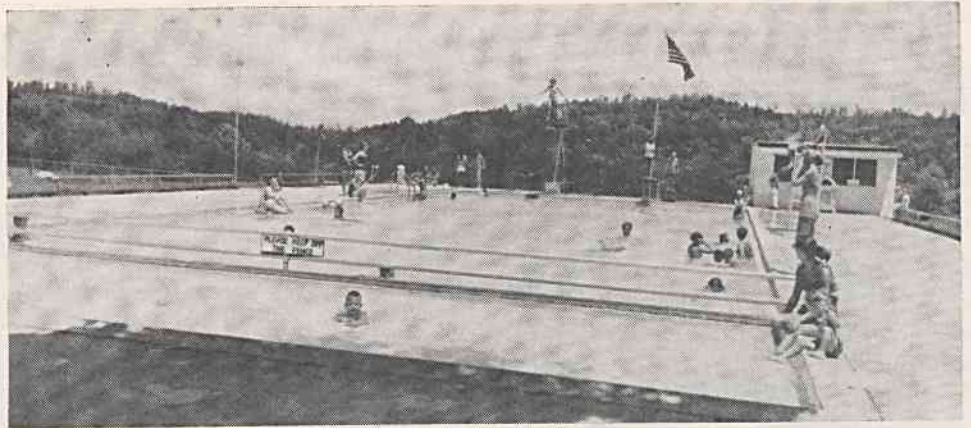


## Fieldale Pool

## Fieldcrest's Son To Go To World Jamboree

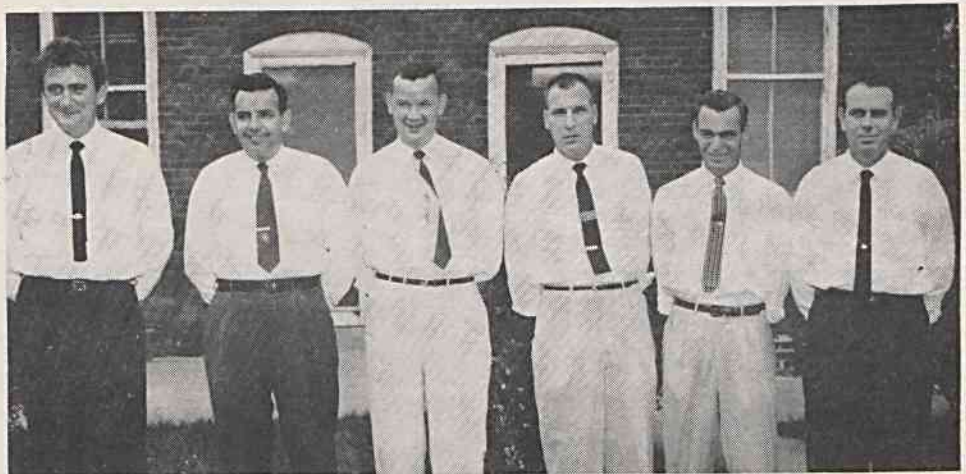
