Junior Council Will Have Program Sept. 9

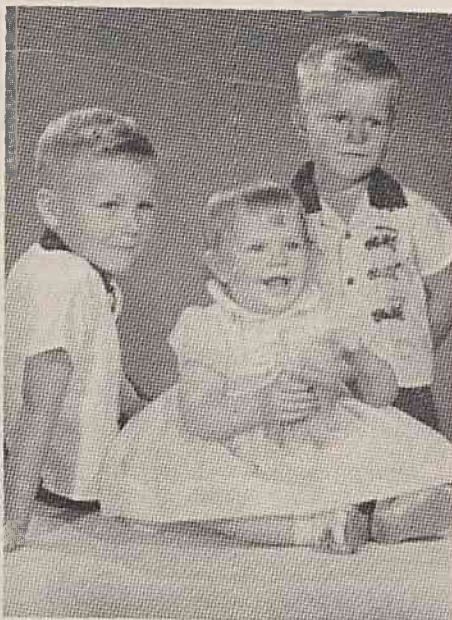
