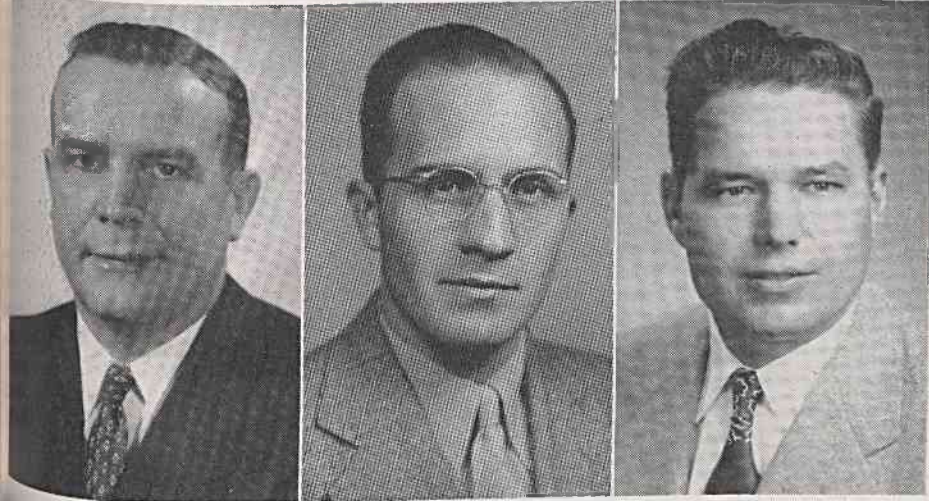


Fieldcrest Men Head Local Boy Scouts

Imports Rising

Recently published figures show that 1959 imports of cotton goods made by foreign textile manufacturers rose 28 per cent over 1958.

At the same time, exports of cotton goods made by American workmen decreased from 501,000,000 yards in 1958 to about 439,000,000 in 1959. The decrease is about 12% of the 1958 total.

Imports of wool goods increased 32 per cent over 1959, to a total of 45,000,000 square yards. Some observers of the textile industry fear that wool imports will continue to increase, rather than decline. Imports of cotton goods have been rising sharply during the past few years and 1959 saw a huge increase in imports of man-made fiber fabrics and apparel.

Towel Mill Honors Top Weavers, Fixers

The Towel Mill's top quality weavers and loomfixers are listed below for the most recent periods of record.

The leading operators are singled out for recognition under a program at the Towel Mill designed to encourage quality and efficiency in the weave room. New names appear frequently, indicating keen competition among the weavers and loomfixers.

"The Weavers of the Week" are those with the lowest percentage of seconds with respect to the standards for the various loom groups.

The top loomfixers are determined through a combination of low seconds and high loom efficiency on the sections for which they are responsible.
