Bloodmobile To Visit Draper May 24

Employees Of Blanket, Sheeting Mills To Have Prominent Part; Quota Is 142 Pints

The Bloodmobile will be stationed at the First Methodist Church in Draper from 11:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m. Wednesday, May 24, as the unit makes its third visit to the Tri-Cities since the local area began participation in the Piedmont Carolinas' Blood Program.


Although donors are expected from Leaksville, Spray, and the outlying areas as well as Draper, the unit will be stationed in Draper for the convenience of those who live or work in Draper.

Solicitors are working throughout the community to recruit donors for the Bloodmobile visit. Assisting in the Draper area are members of the Methodist Men's organization at the Draper church.

The quota has been set at a minimum of 142 pints. This is in line with the Tri-City area's yearly quota of 850 pints, an amount considered adequate for the needs of local people at the Morehead Memorial Hospital.

The community-wide program was undertaken at the request of the medical staff of the Morehead Memorial Hospital in order that there might be a ready supply of life-saving blood and its derivatives to enable the hospital to serve its patients better.

Under the plan, the hospital is supplied blood through the official Red Cross Program, and all patients from the Tri-City area receive their total blood needs at the local hospital, without (Continued on Page Two)

Three Scholarships Awarded By Foundation

Standards Department Employee, Two Morehead Seniors Are Recipients Of Grants

Recipients of three \$2,000 Fieldcrest scholarships awarded through the Fieldcrest Foundation were announced May 10 by President Harold W. Whitcomb.

The winners, chosen by the Scholarship Committee from among the 24 applicants were Darrell C. Steagall, son of Mr. and Mrs. James J. Steagall; Miss Glenda Dale Overby, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Overby; and William Gale Rhodes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Rhodes.

Darrell Steagall's father is a weaver at the Bedsread Mill; Miss Overby's father is a shearing machine operator at the Bedsread Mill; and Gale Rhodes' father is assistant designer in the Textile Designing Department.

Darrell Steagall graduated from Tri-City High School in 1955 and is presently employed in the Standards Department at the Karastan Rug Mill. His wife, the former Patricia Cochran, is employed as a secretary at Karastan. Mr. Steagall plans to attend North Carolina State College and major in textile management.

Miss Overby and Mr. Rhodes were

tied for the highest scholastic standing in the 1961 class at Morehead High School. She will enroll at Woman's College, Greensboro. She will major in mathematics and plans to become a teacher.

Mr. Rhodes plans to attend North Carolina State College and will major in electrical engineering.

The scholarships, each worth a total of \$2,000, will be continued for four years of college attendance conditioned upon the recipient's maintenance of an acceptable record.
