Scholarship Applications Being Accepted

The Fieldcrest Scholarship Committee March 1 began accepting applications for the scholarships given by the Fieldcrest Foundation to assist employees or children of employees of Fieldcrest Mills, Inc., in securing a college education.

Individuals who wish to be considered for the scholarships must submit an application in writing prior to April 1, 1963, to the Scholarship Committee. Awards of the scholarships will be announced by June 1, 1963.

An application form may be secured from the Industrial Relations representatives in the mills; by calling at the Employment Office of Fieldcrest Mills, Inc., in the General Offices building in Spray; or by writing to Dr. William McGehee, director of personnel research and training, Fieldcrest Mills, Inc., Spray.

Each scholarship has a total cash value of \$2,000 over a period of four years at the rate of \$500 for each of the four years of college attendance.

Scholarships are awarded each year, but it is expected that once a student is awarded a scholarship in his freshman year the scholarship will be renewed for three successive years.

The scholarships are awarded to high school graduates who are entering college for the first time. To be eligible for consideration for a scholarship, the recipient must plan to enroll in an academic four-year college or university in a course of studies leading to a recognized undergraduate academic degree.
