#### Dunton Is Purchasing Agent And Fuller Cost Supervisor For Newly-Acquired Plant



Mr. Stranger was in military service during World War II and after his return was assigned a territory covering central and southwestern states. 11 While traveling the Southwest he lived in St. Louis a part of the time.

When the Zion Lace Curtain Mill was closed in 1952, Mr. Stranger was transferred to the Fieldcrest sales division. He was assigned to northern California to develop accounts and sell directly in the smaller towns of the area. His territory has since been enlarged to include Nevada.
