In last year's tremendously successful campaign, well over 90 per cent of the employees contributed on the day's pay basis and 96 per cent of all employees in the mill made contributions in some amount.

Departments in which 100% of the employees gave a day's pay or more in the 1962 campaign were: Plant Service and Superintendent's Office, Slashing, Cloth Room, Beam Dyeing, Bleachery, Piece Dyeing, Cost and Payroll, Standards, Production Control, Personnel-Village, Warehousing and Data Processing, Management group, and Burns Guards.

Under the Fieldale plan, only one solicitation is conducted each year in the Towel Mill. The money raised is used for the Community Fund and for other authorized fund drives including the Heart Fund, Cancer Fund, March of Dimes, the Martinsville-Henry County United Fund, and other local causes.

The funds are administered by a committee composed of representatives from each department in the mill.
