

## Stiles R. Fifield Dies After Illness

Fieldcrest Vice President Was Prominent In Cotton Trade For Over 25 Years.

Sadness was felt throughout the Fieldcrest organization when Stiles Rich Fifield, vice president-purchasing, died at his home in Greensboro December 23, after a long illness.

Mr. Fifield had been with Fieldcrest since April 1953, when he was appointed director of raw materials purchasing. He was promoted to vice president-purchasing in July 1955, in charge of raw materials and supply purchasing, traffic, and the local Fieldcrest Store.

With a background of experience in the textile industry, he was prominent in the cotton trade for over 25 years. He was vice chairman of the cotton committee of the North Carolina Textile Manufacturers Association and past chairman of the association's cotton buyers and classers division. He was an NCTMA delegate to the National Cotton Council.
