189 Employees Make Safety Suggestions

Safety Program At Karastan Gets Wide Participation; Cash Awards Are Presented Three Employees

As part of its continuing program promoting safety, the Karastan Mill has just concluded a safety suggestion contest in which 189 employees submitted written suggestions for safety improvements on their respective jobs.

Cash prizes of \$10 each were presented to the three employees whose suggestions were chosen by a committee as being the best among those submitted. The winners and their suggested improvements were:

Colonel Evans, Weave Room—relating to placement of ladder used when tying on filling and size of hoist used for pile beams.

George Justice, Finishing Department concerning ways to prevent climbing on machine, extension of hood over beater and placement of beater lever.

Evelyn M. Nelson, Setting Department Suggestions covering 10 points of safety relative to setting machine operation. In announcing the contest, the supervisors conducted a series of meetings involving all employees in the mill. Information was presented on the mill's safety performance. The supervisors also gave information on the type of accidents that have occurred at Karastan and there were discussions on how to prevent such injuries in the future.

At the close of the meetings, each employee was given a safety suggestion form to be used in the contest. The form carried a space for listing any hazards on the individual's job and a column for listing proposed safety improvements.

In addition to the improvements suggested by the three award winners, many other good suggestions were made in the contest. Where feasible, the sug-
