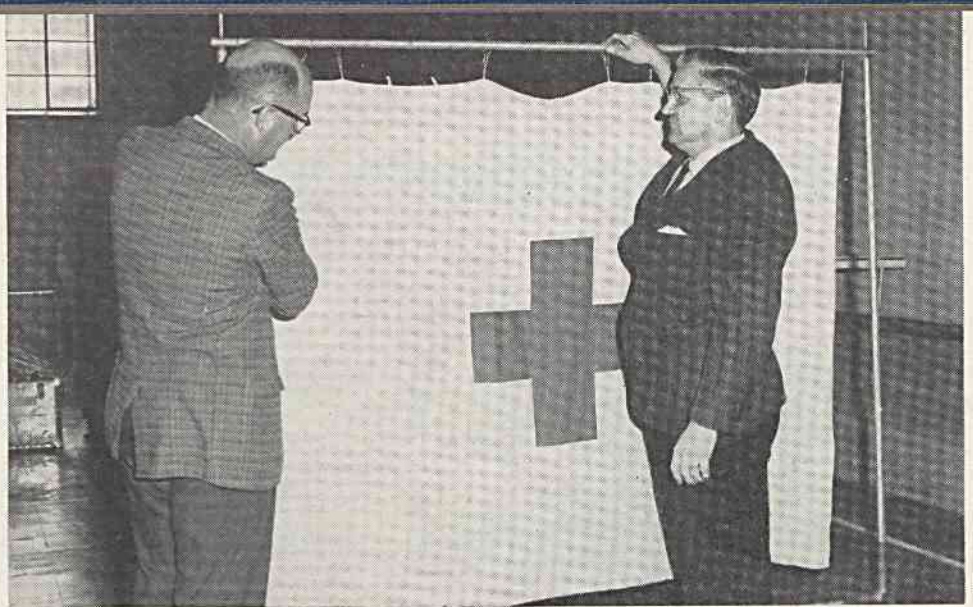




Alvin Maness, of the Blanket Mill, gets cup of water before giving blood. Seated is Mrs. J. M. Wright, volunteer worker.

Bloodmobile Obtains 101 Pints At Draper

Of the 101 persons who donated blood when the Bloodmobile was at the Draper Christian Church last week, 77 were from Fieldcrest Mills. Although most of the Fieldcresters who gave blood were from the Blanket and Sheeting mills, there also were donors from the Finishing Mill, General Offices, Karastan Mill, Mechanical Development Department and the Draper Standards Department.

Seven persons—all from Fieldcrest—donated their eighth pint and qualified for membership in the "Gallon Club." These were: Frances Compton, Ralph Going, William Heffinger, Billie Hodges, Paul Land, George Minter and Norman Young.

Among those who gave blood, 14 were first-time donors. Nineteen persons gave blood in the name of some other person who had received blood under the program. Forty-two volunteer workers gave a total of 147 hours to the project.

The visit was sponsored by the Draper Y's Men's Club, whose members helped to recruit donors and assisted in various other ways. As on past Bloodmobile visits to Draper, the Rebel CB Club used radio-dispatched cars to provide transportation for donors who needed it.

Clay Barrow of the Blanket Mill who is the Blood Program recruitment chairman for Draper, and Norman Young of the Blanket Mill, the Blood Program co-chairman, expressed appreciation to all donors and to the volunteer workers who assisted.

"While we had hoped to obtain 150 pints, we are nevertheless pleased with the results of this visit. The date was somewhat unfavorable, being so near to Christmas," Mr. Young said. "However, the response was such that we are encouraged to believe that we will get the program back on a sound basis during the coming year."

He said the next Bloodmobile visit will be to Leaksville January 29, and urged that large numbers of local people resolve now to contribute blood at that time.
