

A Better Place To Work

Textile industry spending for modernization and expansion during the past dozen years has amounted to almost five billion dollars. It has made the industry one of the nation's most modern manufacturing industries, and a good place to work.

If the industry's hopes come true, it will be an even better place to work this year.

The government forecasts, on the basis of reports from individual companies, that the textile industry will spend more than a billion dollars this year for new plants and the necessary goods to equip them. If the predictions come true, it will be the first time the textile industry has ever spent, or been able to spend, more than a billion dollars in a single year for modernization and expansion.

The actual prediction is for an expenditure of \$1.02-billion, more than a quarter of a billion dollars over last year's record-setting total of \$760-million. The increase would be one of the largest among all American industries.

The spending is part of a long-range effort to insure that the textile industry is able to meet any challenge that faces it. It reflects what the industry's chief spokesman, President William E. Reid of American Textile Manufacturers Institute, calls a "concept of progress" that has made the industry one of the most modern in the world.

"What all of this money and energy is going into is a production system that can handle any challenge thrown at it," Mr. Reid says. "We have the best textile industry in the world, and we intend to keep it that way."

Advance Preparation Speeds Social Security Claims

BE PREPARED! This is the motto of the Boy Scouts. It is also a good motto for the person getting ready to retire. If you are preparing to retire from your job, you will also probably be thinking about filing for your Social Security.

The people at the Social Security Offices are ready to assist you, but there are certain things you can do in advance to speed the processing of your claim.

First, be sure to have your social security card with you when you call at the Social Security Office. Also, you will need to furnish proof of your age.

If you do not have a birth certificate, some old document such as an insurance policy that shows your age or date of birth can be used. You should take a copy of your 1964 W-2, Withholding Statement, with you.

If your wife is eligible to receive benefits on your record because she is at least 62 years of age, she will need to furnish some proof of her age. A birth certificate recorded at or near birth should be furnished if available. If a birth certificate is not available, an old document such as an insurance policy which shows her age or date of birth can be used.

Birth certificates will be needed for all minor children, including stepchildren and adopted children. If you have an adopted child, you must submit cer-

tified copies of the adoption decree which will also become a part of the claim and cannot be returned.

By having as much of the required information as possible, days and even weeks can be saved in processing your claim. If you have any difficulty obtaining any documents or evidence, contact your Social Security Office and they will assist you in any way possible.

Difference May Appear In Income Tax Refund

Was the amount of your refund check different from what you expected? "Don't be disturbed—you will receive an explanation for the difference within a few days from the Internal Revenue Service," J. E. Wall, district director of Internal Revenue, said.

When a refund income tax return is received in the Chamblee Service Center, it is carefully examined for obvious errors or omissions. If there is an error in arithmetic, a correction is made after the information on the return has passed through the computer.

A refund check is then issued for the corrected amount of a refund. In the meantime, a detailed explanation for the difference is mailed to the taxpayer immediately. However, this notice may not be received until after the taxpayer has received his refund check.

Director Wall said that "When you receive your refund check, if you discover that the amount differs from what you expected, please wait a few days before contacting Internal Revenue." But, after receiving the explanation for the difference in amounts, if there are any questions, address your inquiry to the District Director of Internal Revenue for your area.

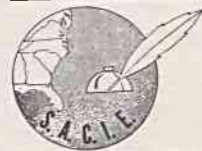
